Background Information

- The City of Montgomery's Department of Planning coordinates the planning and administration of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) and the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds which are provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).
- As a HUD participating jurisdiction, the Community Development Division structures and shapes programmatic services for low-to-moderate income households in the City of Montgomery, Alabama.
- The Community Development Division partners with non-profits, for-profits, Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), contractors, faith-based organizations, lenders, and other charity organizations to meet our programmatic goals and objectives.



The Purpose of this Public Hearing: Statutory Requirement by HUD

- We are required to hold a minimum of two (2) public hearings during the program year:
 - Consolidated & Action Plan – To discuss community development and housing needs as well as implementation of Plan (August)
 - Consolidated Annual Performance & Evaluation Report (CAPER) - Review of program performance (July)
- We are required to take comments during the comment period and forward those comments to our HUD office.
- All public hearing and comment period announcements are advertised in the Montgomery Advertiser newspaper and posted in area libraries, City Hall, and the Department of Planning.



Encouragement of Citizens Participation & Comments

- This public hearing, presented by the City of Montgomery's Community Development Division, is conducted to ensure citizen participation in the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funded programs.
- The purpose of this Hearing is to meet the requirements set forth in Section 104 of the 1974 Housing and Community Development Act as amended, and 24 CFR 91 to provide for citizen involvement in the planning and implementation of the City of Montgomery's Community Development Program.

Consolidated & Action Plan

- The Consolidated Plan serves as a 5-year strategic plan for allocating the City's CDBG, HOME, and ESG program funds and requires an annual Action Plan with proposed activities to be submitted to HUD for approval by March 17th of each year.
- The City identifies and prioritizes housing and community needs.
- Copies of the Consolidated and Action Plans are made available to the public and are located at City Hall, the Community Development Office and the Juliette Hampton-Morgan library.



Program Year 2015-2016 HUD Programs Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program

- National Objective: Proposed programs must meet one of the following criteria:
 - Benefit Low-Moderate Income (LMI) individuals/families in the City of Montgomery
 - Eliminate slum or blight
 - Meet an urgent need (disaster or catastrophic situations)
- CDBG funds must benefit 70% LMI individuals/families in the City of Montgomery
- CDBG Eligible Activities:
 - Acquisition of Real Property, Disposition of Real Property, Public Facilities & Improvements
 - Clearance and Demolition, Public Services, Homeowner Assistance
 - Rehabilitation & Historic Preservation Activities
 - Special Economic Development Activities
 - Planning



Program Year 2015-2016 HUD Programs

HOME Partnership Investment Grant Program

- National Objective: Proposed programs must meet the following objectives:
 - Provide decent and affordable housing to Low-Moderate Income (LMI) individuals/families in the City of Montgomery
 - Expand the capacity of non-profit housing providers
- HOME funds must benefit 100% (LMI) individuals/families in the City of Montgomery
- Eligible Activities
 - Homeowner Rehabilitation (Rehabilitation or Reconstruction)
 - Homebuyer Activities (Down-payment Assistance)
 - Construction of Affordable Housing
 - **Special Note: A minimum of 15% of the City's HOME program allocation must be used for housing owned, developed, or sponsored by Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs)**



Program Year 2015-2016 HUD Programs Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program

- National Objectives: Proposed programs must meet the following objectives:
 - Help operate emergency shelters and transitional facilities for homeless people.
 - Provide essential support services to residents.
 - Help prevent at-risk families or individuals from becoming homeless.
- Examples of Eligible Activities:
 - Renovation, major or conversion of buildings to be used as emergency shelters.
 - Essential Services for homeless individual/families homeless individual/families Immediate Needs of homeless individual/families (employment, health, drug abuse, and/or educational needs).
 - Assist homeless individuals/families with securing permanent housing.
 - Assist shelter providers with maintenance, operation, insurance, utilities, 11 furnishings and staffing cost.

Community Development Block Grant Program Public Service Activities

- The city will not consider any grant requests smaller than \$25,000. The maximum amount allowed for public service activities is \$75,000.
- Organizations will be required to collect income verification documents unless your beneficiaries are from a presumed benefit category (homeless persons, battered spouses, abused children, elderly persons, severely disabled adults as defined by HUD, illiterate adults, persons living with AIDS, or migrant farm workers).



Other CDBG, HOME, ESG Programmatic Fees/Limitations

- CDBG
 - Grant Administration (salary, overhead, etc.): Not more than **20%** of Total Award unless directly activity-related
 - Consulting Fees: Not more than **5%** of Total Award
 - Developer's Fees: Not more than **10%** of Total Award (Construction Projects ONLY)
- HOME
 - Grant Administration (salary, overhead, etc.): Not more than **10%** of Total Award
 - Consulting Fees: Not more than **5%** of Total Award
 - Developer's Fees: Not more than **10%** of Total Award
- ESG
 - Grant Administration (salary, overhead, etc.): Not more than **5%** of Total Award

Application Preparation Tips

- Application Due Date: **December 2, 2014**
- A separate application must be submitted for each proposed project.
- Provide one (1) original and two (2) copies.
- Please read the application and instructions carefully.
- Answer all questions completely (Do not leave any section blank).
- Complete the coversheet.
- Sign all signature pages in **BLUE INK** only. ALL signatures (even copies) must be original.
- Double-check figures and totals on budget.
- We will not accept faxed or emailed applications.
- Applications must score a minimum of 80 points to be considered for funding (CDBG).
- Minimum Public Service CDBG Request: \$25,000 - Maximum CDBG Request \$75,000.
- Please allow time for parking and entrance into the building on due date.
- Any application received after **2:00 p.m.** will be accepted but not considered for funding – **NO EXCEPTIONS!**



E-Verify Forms

- Due to the new Immigration Law, the City is now required by the State to collect E-Verify forms on any vendor that currently has a contract (or performs any services) with the City of Montgomery.
 - This information is required by all organizations/vendors doing business with most any Federal agency or local government. It states that your organization shall not knowingly employ, hire for employment, or continue to employ an unauthorized alien.
 - This document basically is a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Homeland Security and your organization regarding participation in the Employment Eligibility Verification Program (E-Verify).
- Please visit the Homeland Security website at <http://www.uscis.gov/e-verify> to register your organization and print the 13-page MOU.
- Please note that the E-Verify form should have a SIX DIGIT registration number assigned and printed on the form. This registration process does not take long and is usually completed by a Director or financial liaison.
- City of Montgomery's E-Verify Affidavit should be filled out, notarized, and signed (**blue ink**) and returned with E-Verify registration forms.
